Epistle Reading

The reading is from St. Paul's Letter to Titus 3:8-15

TITUS, my son, the saying is sure. I desire you to insist on these things, so that those who have believed in God may be careful to apply themselves to good deeds; these are excellent and profitable to men. But avoid stupid controversies, genealogies, dissensions, and quarrels over the law, for they are unprofitable and futile. As for a man who is factious, after admonishing him once or twice, have nothing more to do with him, knowing that such a person is perverted and sinful; he is self-condemned. When I send Artemas or Tychicos to you, do your best to come to me at Nicopolis, for I have decided to spend the winter there. Do your best to speed Zenas the lawyer and Apollos on their way; see that they lack nothing. And let our people learn to apply themselves to good deeds, so as to help cases of urgent need, and not to be unfruitful. All who are with me send greeting to you. Greet those who love us in the faith. Grace be with you all. Amen.

Gospel Reading

Matthew 5:14-19

The Lord said to his disciples, "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven. Think not that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets; I have come not to abolish them but to fulfill them. For truly, I say to you, till heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. Whoever then relaxes one of the least of these commandments and teaches men so, shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but he who does them and teaches them shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven."

Message from Fr. Michael...

Dearly Beloved Faithful:

Today, we commemorate the Holy Fathers. The writings and teachings of these fathers, through their reception of the Holy Spirit, have allowed all of Christianity to flourish. How wonderful it was most recently in Crete for the Great Holy Council to convene after many centuries of silence. The love and unity shown at this magnificent event provided the fuel for the Word of God to continue to be disseminated throughout the world. The Divine Light of God was cast upon these fathers as it was in earlier centuries with the 7 early ecumenical councils. We recognize the Holy Fathers for their model of inspiration as their light was seen by all the faithful through their reception of the Holy Spirit. It is the hope of the Church that such light will shine upon all loving people of God.

We hope and pray that the light cast by our faithful worship will be seen by all and motivate all to migrate toward the Lord's Holy House. As we read from the scriptural passage above, from the Gospel of St. Matthew, the Lord directs that our light is to shine before our brethren. In doing so, our brethren may see our good works. When our good works are seen by others, we are giving God the glory. Our heavenly Father looks upon us with His tender mercy and send His grace upon us. Did you know that St. Paul wrote almost half of the New Testament and he did so under captivity. He was imprisoned and in chains when he wrote his letters and teachings. The adversaries that imprisoned him actually did a great favor to Christianity. By imprisoning St. Paul, this allowed him to write and these writings helped to provide the foundation for Christian teachings that would persevere for many centuries that would follow. The teachings of the Fathers enlighten us to God's love and mercy. They encourage us to heed to God's call. Yes, let us be lights...for the illumination of our fellow Christians to promote God's Word! Let the glitter be in spreading the message of the Lord's Gospel! Be a bright flame for Him...for the Lord. illuminating the hearts and souls of everyone you encounter is what we hope for. Lead those who have strayed away back to the faith.

Will we heed to the calling of evil and take the bait of worldliness? Or do we possess the intelligence, faith, and purity to follow the Creator?

Let us be a light house of the faith. Let our light be seen on the hill for all to see, May our spiritual light continue to shine before all people. May we inspire all who witness its glow to follow Christ.

Through the prayers and intercession of our holy fathers, we ask our Lord to hear our petitions and may our Lord grant His mercy upon us all.

Sunday of the Holy Fathers



On the Sunday that falls from the 13th to the 19th of the present month, we chant the Service to the Holy and God-bearing Fathers who came together in the Seven Ecumenical Councils, that is: the First Council, of the 318 Fathers who assembled in Nicaea in 325 to condemn Arius, who denied that the Son of God is consubstantial with the Father; the Fathers of the First Council also ordained that the whole Church should celebrate Pascha according to the same reckoning; the Second Council, of the 150 Fathers who assembled in Constantinople in 381 to condemn Macedonius, Patriarch of Constantinople, who denied the Divinity of the Holy Spirit; the Third Council, of the

200 Fathers who assembled in Ephesus in 431, to condemn Nestorius, Patriarch of Constantinople, who called Christ a mere man and not God incarnate; the Fourth Council, of the 630 who assembled in Chalcedon in 451, to condemn Eutyches, who taught that there was only one nature, the divine, in Christ after the Incarnation, and Dioscorus, Patriarch of Alexandria, who illegally received Eutyches back into communion and deposed Saint Flavian, Patriarch of Constantinople, who had excommunicated Eutyches; the Fifth Council in 553, of the 165 who assembled in Constantinople for the second time to condemn Origen and Theodore of Mopsuestia, the teacher of Nestorius; the Sixth Council in 680, of the 170 who assembled in Constantinople for the third time, to condemn the Monothelite heresy, which taught that there is in Christ but one will, the divine; and the Seventh Council in 787, of the 350 who assembled in Nicaea for the second time to condemn Iconoclasm.

The Holy Great Martyr Marina (Margaret)



This Martyr lived during the reign of Claudius II (268-270). She was from Pisidia of Cilicia and was the only daughter of a certain priest of the idols. On being orphaned by her mother, she was handed over to a certain woman who instructed her in the Faith of Christ. When she was fifteen years old, she was apprehended by the ruler of Olmbrius, and when asked her name, homeland. and faith, she answered: "My name is Marina; I am the offspring of the Pisidia; I call upon the Name of my Lord Jesus Christ." Because of this she endured bonds, imprisonment, and whippings, and was finally beheaded in the year 270. Saint Marina is especially invoked for deliverance from demonic possession.
