Epistle Reading Colossians 4:5-11, 14-18

Brethren, conduct yourselves wisely toward outsiders, making the most of the time. Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer every one. Tychicos will tell you all about my affairs; he is a beloved brother and faithful minister and fellow servant in the Lord. I have sent him to you for this very purpose, that you may know how we are and that he may encourage your hearts, and with him Onesimos, the faithful and beloved brother, who is one of yourselves. They will tell you of everything that has taken place. Aristarchos my fellow prisoner greets you, and Mark the cousin of Barnabas (concerning whom you have received instructions if he comes to you, receive him), and Jesus who is called Justos. These are the only men of the circumcision among my fellow workers for the kingdom of God, and they have been a comfort to me. Luke the beloved physician and Demas greet you. Give my greetings to the brethren at Laodicea, and to Nympha and the church in her house. And when this letter has been read among you, have it read also in the church of the Laodiceans; and see that you read also the letter from Laodicea. And say to Archippos, "See that you fulfill the ministry which you have received in the Lord." I, Paul, write this greeting with my own hand. Remember my fetters. Grace be with you. Amen.

Gospel Reading Luke 10:16-21

The Lord said to his disciples, "He who hears you hears me, and he who rejects you rejects me, and he who rejects me rejects him who sent me." The seventy returned with joy, saying, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us in your name!" And he said to them, "I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Behold, I have given you authority to tread upon serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing shall hurt you. Nevertheless do not rejoice in this, that the spirits are subject to you; but rejoice that your names are written in heaven." In that same hour he rejoiced in the Holy Spirit and said, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that you have hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to babes; yes, Father, for such was your gracious will."

Message from Fr. Michael.....

Dear Beloved Faithful:

In one of the gospel readings, we read that the Lord is greeted by a demoniac. The demoniac views the Lord, Jesus, as the Son of God and worried what Jesus might do to him. The man who approached the Lord was possessed by a multitude of demons rather than just one. We recognize that sinners are really slaves of Satan, as Scripture teaches. Such individuals are led down a path leading to spiritual doom. If we stop and contemplate what it means to be demon possessed, we recognize that this man was deprived of reason. The man did not know who he was, where he was, or what he was doing. Unfortunately, unbelievers are committed to being oblivious or in denial of their own reason. This leads to persistent stubborn denial of God's truth. These poor lost souls are compelled to adhere to contradictions and even attempt to rationalize irrational views. In the gospel reading, the demoniac was deprived of his own will. This unbelieving demoniac was deprived of fellowship and cast out of his community. Once we become demoniacally possessed, and become a non-believer, we become separated from the covenants of promise. As we witnessed, through listening to the gospel reading, the demoniac was deprived of his dignity. He remained naked for a long period of time. The non-believer lives in a primitive and animal-like state, seeking to satisfy basic needs for survival now and nothing more. Such individuals have no concern for everlasting life... no concern for salvation. The demoniac was deprived of being himself. We recognize the symbolism when we hear the story of this demoniac living amongst the tombs. This non-believing demoniac was dead in sin. He was dead due to his trespasses.


We must realize that there is no more hope for those that simply live apart from Christ and those who are fully demonically possessed. However, there is hope for such individuals. In verse 35, we read: "And they came to Jesus and found the man from whom the demons had gone out sitting down at the feet of Jesus clothed and in his right mind; and they became frightened." When we live apart from the Lord, we suffer from deprivations. Such individuals are on the path leading to Hell. That is the plan Satan desires for such individuals. They may be restored by Christ as we heard of the demons had gone out of the young man. He was then found sitting at the feet of our Lord, clothed and in his right mind. When we come to the Lord, after being away from Him, we are then no longer naked or deprived. We are only then in our right mind since it is irrational to be away from Him.

May we now come back to the Lord, if we have drifted away. May we regain our rationality by coming back to the Author of Life who promises everlasting life! May His blessing be upon us so that we return back on track and give God the glory!

Saints and Feasts Commemorated



Luke the Evangelist

This Apostle was an Antiochean. a physician by trade, and a disciple and companion of Paul. He wrote his Gospel in Greek after Matthew and Mark, after which he wrote the the Apostles, Acts of and dedicated both works to Theophilus, who, according to some, was Governor of Achaia. He lived some eighty-six years and died in Achaia, perhaps in Patras, the capital of this district. His emblem is the calf, the third symbolical beast mentioned by Ezekiel (1:10), which is a symbol of Christ's sacrificial and priestly office, as Saint Irenaeus says.

Homily 44 on Matthew 12, 4th Century

A soul which has been caught to serve the enemy's will then serves as a snare for other souls, for it conceals the grief of sin with its apparent delight.
